PASTOR'S PEN

Dear friends and family of Plymouth,

Sometimes the best sermon thoughts don't come to me until after worship is over and I'm at home watching the Packers. So it was with my sermon on October 12 (read or listen on the church's website at pcucc.com/ sermons/141012.html). The preaching text was the Parable of the Wedding Feast, in which a king throws a wedding feast but when none of the people he invited come, he sends his servants out to invite whoever they find. I said the heroes in the story were the servants who were willing to be invitational, though I hedged that by saying they were doing it under the king's command and our situation isn't quite like theirs.

But I was wrong. The thought that didn't come to me until Sunday afternoon is that our situation is like theirs. We, too, have a king who has told us to invite people: Jesus. He gave us the Great Commission to make disciples of the nations. Inviting is part of our job description.

The current research numbers say that 87% of people who become part of a church were invited. They came in on someone's elbow. You have a lot of power through the act of offering an invitation. Here are some events that are invitation worthy. We will hand out treats on Halloween night at the end of the driveway. For the Holiday Bazaar, invite a friend to work with you, or offer to buy them lunch and then introduce them to church members while you're eating. We are serving at Community

Table on November 22, which is a very non-intimidating event to bring someone on your elbow to experience Plymouth. Invite someone to Sunday morning worship and tell them you'll take them to lunch afterward. Or invite them for a special Sunday. Cathy Reitz is singing on November 2 and Eric Nielsen on November 9. Invite them to hear inspiring and beautifully sung music. We are also serving lunch after worship on November 9.

Don't forget the electronic elbows. Share church events on Facebook and/or share sermons, photos, or other things that we have posted online. Those are invitations, too.

Invitations have great power, and as I mentioned in the sermon, they are also a compliment. Invitations say, "I like you enough that I'd like you to be part of something that is special to me."

Who will you invite?

October 13, 2014

Barb called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. The September Council minutes were reviewed and approved.

Financial Reports:

As of September 30, 2014 Year to Date Income \$87,694.32 Year to Date Expenses \$86,352.46 Ahead (Behind) \$1,341.86

Treasurer's Report:

Income for September was \$8,158.75. Total expenses for the month were \$8,078.68, leaving us with a September gain of \$80.07. Funds were transferred from other accounts and the Thrift Sale income was \$1,705.38. There has been some Thrift Sale income in October also. General Fund bank balance was \$26.85.

Reserve Fund Balance: \$2,670.43

Memorial Fund Balance: \$13,048.50

Street Ministry Balance: \$884.54

Financial reports were reviewed and accepted.

Building and Grounds:

Gutters have been cleaned.

Maintenance is being done as needed.

Christian Education Commission:

Sunday, October 26 a Halloween party is being planned from 1–3 P.M. Everyone is invited. Sunday School

has an account with \$116.00 and would like to give it to the Moon Beach Scholarship Fund. Rob will do this.

Stewardship Commission:

Discussed the Thrift Sale—largest one so far at over \$1,700.

Worship Commission:

All Saints' Day—Barb will get the roses. Pot luck will be the second week in November.

Service Commission:

Pastor David and others are making regular visits. Remember to fill out visitation cards—even for phone visits. Thank you!

Women of Plymouth:

As always gas gift cards or donations for fuel for the van. Fast food restaurants gift cards for Subway, McDonald's and Burger King etc. We will eventually start needing handwarmers, the 8 and 10 hour type.
